Sound Theology Produces Glorifying Missions

missionaries embark on foreign ministries with very little theological training. After a few years, it is not uncommon for some to recognize a need for theological studies. Of these, several have turned to the IRTC to feed them with deeper and broader understanding because its teaching is accessible to them on the field and because it is Reformed. In fact, Reformed theology is especially relevant for missions.



Its point of departure is the pursuit of the glory of the Most High and this pursuit opens to sinners a life of meaning that goes far beyond decisions for Christ as a Savior from personal distress.

Total depravity, irresistible grace, unconditional election, limited atonement and perseverance of the saints are at the foundation of this pursuit, for they show sinners their own inability and God's allencompassing sovereignty. When a missionary explains these theological and biblical concepts in language and contexts understandable by his hearers, God is honored.

Next, in Reformed theology we see the Reformation "solas," such as to give all glory to God alone, to recognize

Many cross-cultural Scripture as the only rule of faith and practice, to understand that forgiveness is only by faith, worked by God's grace alone, and that there is no salvation apart from Jesus Christ. IRTC students are taught to search the Scriptures in the original languages and their hearts are filled with rich comprehension when these truths are read in them.

> Then, we come to the covenant. No human relationship can compare with the one expressed in the communion of God's covenant of grace, a doctrine frequently highlighted in the Bible and in Reformed theology. Mission has the task of explaining to man that God establishes a covenant with his chosen ones.

> The term "covenant" has its root in an ancient Ugaritic word meaning "to cut or to split". Covenant-making ceremonies could involve cutting animal sacrifices in half, so that both parties to a covenant could pass between the two parts. In this way, each swore an oath to be faithful unto death, that is, the penalty of unfaithfulness would be death. When such an oath is sworn there are necessarily two possible outcomes for a covenant. Either, it is faithfully kept and the promised blessings are received or it is broken and punishments or curses result, even to the extent of eternal death.

God created man in his own image and likeness to have fellowship with Him, which was to be experienced in a life-giving covenant. In that covenant, the mandate to be fruitful and fill the earth. He second coming of Jesus Christ.

also commanded him to subdue and rule over creation as he cultivated and kept it to the glory of God. Although he was warned in the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, man disobeyed the Lord and broke this excellent covenant. He died on that day, but also received a renewed promise of life through Eve's descendant, who would crush Satan (Genesis 1-3).

God made a covenant with Abraham (Genesis 12) to fulfill what He had promised at the time of the fall (Genesis 3:15). In this covenant, the Lord committed himself forever to Abraham and his descendants, when he symbolically passed between animals that had been cut in two in Genesis 15. Abraham's response was to believe God, who reckoned this faith to him as righteousness. In this, Abraham became a representative for all who believe and are saved.

The response of humanity to God's initiative to them must be given through the fulfillment of the covenantal mandates of Genesis 1 and 2. For this purpose, in the fullness of time, God sent Jesus Christ as the Redeemer to set souls free from sin and misery through His death to satisfy the covenant oath and to establish a new covenant in his blood. Further, He also accomplishes complete fulfillment of these mandates and all who are united to Christ by faith share in the fruit of His accomplishments. In this way good theology leads to a covenantal understanding that must be expressed in Lord blessed man and gave him the the propagation of the gospel until the

Ministerial Activities of the Faculty

In this article, we bring a short report of the ministerial activities of one of our instructors, Pastor Luiz Fernando dos Santos. In the IRTC since 2012, he works as the instructor of the courses Introduction to Philosophy and Scientific Research Methodology.

Professor Luiz Fernando participated as a

lecturer in the course Perspectives Brazil, in Campinas, SP, addressing the theme "The Messiah to the World: The Gospel of the Kingdom" and in São José dos Campos, SP, with the theme "History of the Missionary Movement: 30 AD to 1600 AD." These lectures took place on the 8^{th} and on the 12^{th} of September, respectively.

Last semester, he served as teacher of the course History of Denominations, Sects and Heresies, and currently teaches a course in Strategic Management and Ecclesiastical Planning, both in the Southern Presbyterian Seminary in Campinas, SP.

In the church where he pastors – Presbyterian Church of Itapira – he has developed an essential supportive care project with homeless people (creation and direction of the Samaritan Institute for Social Protection), and a welcoming project that works with Syrian refugees who arrived in Itapira, offering social assistance and spiritual support.

Among his ministerial activities, we can also highlight articles that he has written for the site of the *Ultimato* Journal.


Volunteer Needed
