My mentor, Rev. Jean Joás, played a crucial role in my academic success at the IRTC. He periodically guided me, monitoring my progress and encouraging me to complete my coursework. Throughout my journey, each course became a tool with which to better serve

the church. This has been my intention all along: to continue using what I've learned to support the church community.


